NT

- Department of Territory Families, Housing and Communities (DTFHC).
- Current overcrowding in the NT is 53.5% and an average of 1.53 occupants per bedroom.

Yarralin

- Housing for community members is provided by the Department of Infrastructure, Planning and Logistics (DIPL) through State and Federal funding arrangements. DIPL own all of the community housing assets.
- A significant proportion of this housing stock was delivered through the NPRH.
- The current remote housing program 'Our Community. Our Future. Our Homes.' (OCOHOF) has a \$1.1 billion funding commitment (for the NT remote communities) from State and Federal governments from 2017 through to 2027. As of October 2024, \$5.5 million has been expended in Yarralin:
 - o HomeBuild \$5.3 Million
 - o Room to Breathe \$174,700
 - Government Employee Housing \$2,500

Yarralin Housing Facts and Figures

- 2021 ABS census population = 250 (however Bushtel notes 332)
 - o Using Bushtel figures = 6.64 people per house.
 - o Average number of bedrooms 2.92.
 - o average number of people per bedroom = 2.27
- There are 50 community houses in the DIPL portfolio. Of those, 5 houses or 10% are overcrowded (based on OCOFOH data).
- There are currently 50 dwellings on 37 lots.
- Yarralin can also at times (when cut off in the wet) accommodate Lingara residents a
 population of approximately 46 people.
- Type of house:
 - o 44% of houses are duplexes or units (22x du/quadplexes)
 - o 56% of houses are detached single dwellings (28x houses)
- A high proportion of house types are duplexes (a combination of 2 bedroom or 3 bedroom dwellings).
- Construction date:
 - o 30% houses built prior to 2010.
 - o 70% houses built in the last 7 years.

- A high proportion of housing stock is new. All housing has had refurbishment work done in the last few years, although it's not known the type or extent of work done.
- Dwelling size:
 - o 1 bedroom = 8%
 - o 2 bedroom = 16%
 - o 3 bedroom = 52%
 - o 4 bedroom = 24%
 - o 5 bedroom = 0%
- The majority of dwellings have 3 bedrooms. No houses have 5 bedrooms.

Current Planning Status:

- No Area Plan exists, but there is a Community Land Use Plan
- No township lease currently in place
- Current leasing is done through Section 19 leases via the Northern Land Council (NLC)
- The land is Aboriginal freehold land under the Aboriginal Land Rights Act (ALRA)

How did we get here and where does the community want to go next?

In 2016, the Federal Government returned the title deeds for 50,310sqm of land to Traditional Owners, ending a 44-year land rights battle. The land is now held freehold under the Ngalkarrang-Wulngann Aboriginal Land Trust. This action was a step towards entering into a township lease arrangement with the Federal Government.

Under a township lease, the Traditional Owners voluntarily lease the land to a statutory entity, such as the Executive Director of Township Leasing (EDTL), for a long-term period, often up to 99 years. Ownership remains with the Aboriginal community, but the lease allows for coordinated land management, development, and leasing to third parties for economic purposes, such as housing, businesses, or infrastructure projects.

A Consultative Forum, composed of Traditional Owners, provides advice to the Executive Director, ensuring that land use aligns with community priorities and cultural values. This arrangement streamlines development processes and encourages investment while safeguarding the land's traditional ownership and cultural significance. The revenue generated from subleases is often reinvested in the community, creating long-term economic opportunities.

Township Lease Changes (Section 19A):

Duration: 80-99 years (compared to S.19 leases which are typically up to 40 years) Scope: Covers the entire township within the boundary

Management Options:

EDTL (Executive Director of Township Leasing) Option:

- Held on behalf of Commonwealth
- Uses Consultative Forum Mechanism with Traditional Owner Representatives
- All development needs forum endorsement

Community Entity Option:

- Run by a CATSI Corporation controlled by Traditional Owners
- Governance through Board and CEO structure
- Entity determines decision-making processes

Under township lease, EDTL or Community Entity would:

- Manage sublease arrangements
- Collect lease payments for Traditional Owners
- Use rent for Economic Development and Community purposes

How would you develop a subdivision in Yarralin?

Without Township Lease:

- Developer applies through Northern Land Council
- NLC consults with Traditional Owners and surrounding groups
- Section 19 lease likely needed for housing lots

With Township Lease:

- Developer applies to the EDTL for a development sublease
- Consultative Forum approves

Once the development is complete:

- The development sublease ends.
- The subdivision is held by the Executive Director of Township Leasing (EDTL) or a Community Entity under the township lease.

If community housing is built:

• The EDTL or Community Entity transfers the sublease for the entire subdivision to the CEO of Housing (usually done simultaneously with development completion).

For lots without housing:

- The EDTL or Community Entity can use these lots for potential home ownership.
- Alternatively, the CEO of Housing may request all lots be included in the housing sublease for future community housing.
- These arrangements are identified during initial consultations and endorsed by the Consultative Forum following an application.

We conducted via email.

- On average, how many children attend your service each day?
 10-12 children
- What is the maximum number of children that you can accommodate?
 children
- 3. Is your current facility sufficient in size to service the children currently in your care? It would be good to have more outdoor space, this feels inadequate for the group size and physical needs. Indoor space is adequate.
- 4. Are you expecting more families to want to access your service in the coming months and years?

Yarralin has a good uptake, 0-12 year old populations are high for community size. Hard to predict census data.

5. How many staff work at your centre? How many are local community members and how many are contract workers?

1 nonlocal, 5 local community members

6. Do you have enough houses to accommodate your current contract staff?

No, we would like a least 1 more house for another qualified mentor.

7. Can you think of anything else your centre might need if the population of Yarralin doubled in size? Eg. a bigger playground, a new kitchen.

Larger service, bigger yard, could add another room and separate the age groups.

- Do you have any data related on the expected population growth in Yarralin?No.
- 9. Please list any other information that might be useful.

Infrastructure that impacts service delivery:

Internet & mobile outages

Road closures during wet season impact food sources (childcare feeds children).

We conducted via phone.

1. How many staff do you currently have living in Yarralin?

1 x centre coordinator (Lorraine, from community, lives in her own house)

4 x nurses

1 x GP (almost permanent)

KWH has four houses in the community, which means 1 nurse needs to share with the GP. There are an extra four staff who live in the community and work as cleaners and in reception. They live in their own homes.

- Do you have enough houses to accommodate these staff?No. GP and nurse share.
- 3. Do your staff share a house, or do they each have their own? See above.
- If the population was to double, how many new staff would you require?
 Same as Kalkarindji permanent GP, 6 nurses.
 KWH has 11 houses in Kalkarindji and still struggle when allied staff visit.
- 5. How often does a specialist (physio, dentist etc) visit the community? Regularly, on a Mon-Fri schedule.
- 6. Where are these specialists accommodated? How easy is it to secure accommodation for visiting staff?

Very difficult. The only option is to accommodate them in the motel, and this needs to be booked well in advance.

7. Could the current health clinic (the building and associated infrastructure) handle a population increase?

No. It's already insufficient and struggles to service the current population. The current clinic consists of 1 x room for the GP, 3 x consult rooms and an ED. There are not enough rooms for all staff to work simultaneously.

- 8. Do you have any data related to the expected population growth in Yarralin? Sally will get back to us on that.
- Please list any other information that might be useful.
 Supply issues are becoming more frequent, particularly during the wet season. Medical supplies cannot be replenished as needed (same issue as food and other essential items).

Subject: Community Stakeholder Interview with Luke Simpson, Yarralin Police

We conducted via phone.

1. How many staff do you currently have working at the police station? Please include administration staff and police officers.

4 officers are currently gazetted to Yarralin. But this does not mean they are there! According to Luke, they are sent all over the place depending on need. There have no police in Yarralin for the past week.

There is 1 Aboriginal liaison officer who lives in his own house.

2. Do you have enough houses to accommodate your current staff?

Yes. 4 x 4 bedroom houses belong to police. There is also 4 x 1-bedroom units for visiting officers, however 2 of these are currently occupied by teaching staff.

3. Do your staff share a house, or do they each have their own?

Each officer has their own house in line with Union requirements.

4. If the population was to double, how many new staff would you require?

He couldn't answer that, and he also said the question was irrelevant as they'd never get the police anyway.

5. Could the current police station (the building and associated infrastructure) handle a population increase?

The station and houses were built in 2011 and are adequate in terms of size. The building quality is poor. Cracks appear when it heats up or cools down, and apparently, the government is suing the builder.

6. Do you have any data related on the expected population growth in Yarralin?

No.

7. Please list any other information that might be useful.

Elders are planning Men's Business after Xmas, which is a disaster as the population doubles and they don't have enough provisions or space to cope with the extra activity.

Subject: Community Stakeholder Interview with Julie Richter, Victoria River Downs Station

We conducted via email.

1. Approximately, how many staff work on the station?

Between 18-20 people on the cattle side, Helimuster would have similar numbers. Total would be around 40 people

Are these staff numbers expected to remain stable in the coming months and years?

Yes, it could possibly increase over the years

3. How often would you and/or your staff visit the community of Yarralin?

Probably weekly

4. What are the primary reasons you visit Yarralin?

Health services at the clinic, grocery shopping, police services

5. Thinking of elements such as buildings, roads, and infrastructure – what is your experience like when you visit Yarralin?

Generally good, the services are always supportive of the station staff

How could it be improved?

If you are considering building new infrastructure (store, for example), I would suggest building it out on the main service road. It can be quite dangerous for the community kids with the cars attending the store and backing out. If services such as health clinics, stores and police stations were all out on the main road, visiting patrons wouldn't be driving in amongst the houses where young children are walking the streets.

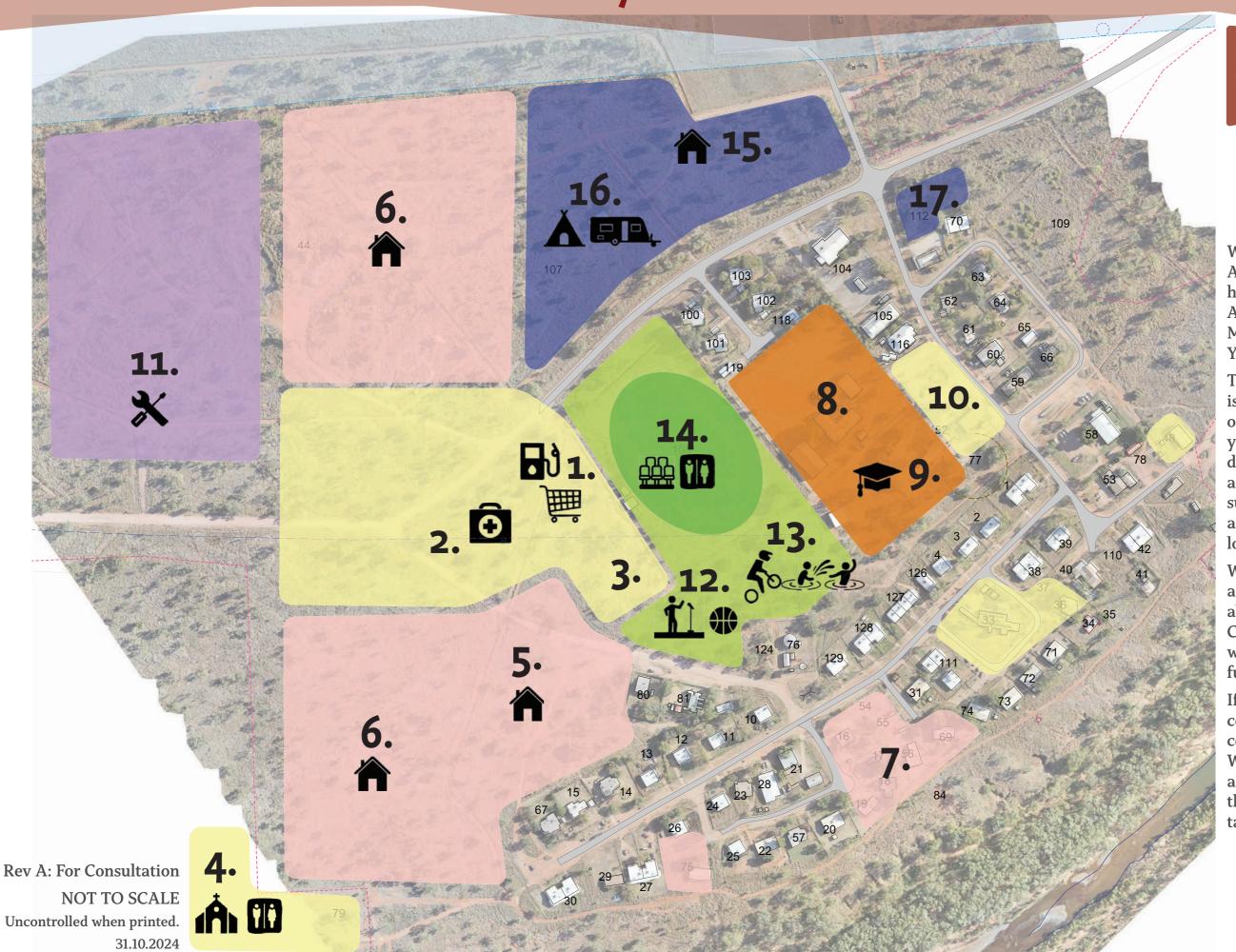
